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Introduction


Target Oxbridge was launched by Rare in 2012 to help improve the representation of Black students at the universities of Oxford and Cambridge. At the time the programme launched, Black African and Caribbean students made up around 1% of the UK-based students attending Oxbridge, despite representing 5% of the A Level population.

As Rare had helped large employers in competitive industries such as law and finance diversify their intakes and hire more Black graduates, we decided to apply our expertise to the world of university access. When we launched Target Oxbridge, it was striking to see just how many applications contained the statement: 'I have never met a Black student who has gone to Oxbridge'.

A decade later, Target Oxbridge has worked with thousands of students across Years 10 to 13, with the bulk of our activity being focused on sixth form students. The programme has provided students with access to current Black Oxbridge students, good and honest advice on subject choice decisions, and personalised support at each step of the application process.

As a result, Target Oxbridge has supported over 350 students of Black heritage to secure Oxbridge offers, helping to transform the narrative about who belongs at the universities of Oxford and Cambridge. Data released this year confirms that the number of UK-based students of Black heritage accepted to Oxbridge has quadrupled since 2012. We are pleased to have contributed to such a significant change.

From its inception, Target Oxbridge has combined advice about university subject choice with informed advice about career opportunities. Rare's relationships with top graduate employers, a number of whom have supported and sponsored the programme for many years, have resulted in students understanding that courses outside of the traditional subjects of Medicine, Law and Engineering can help them to secure good career options.



The impact of Target Oxbridge goes beyond that which is easily quantifiable however. Target Oxbridge alumni have formed life-long friendships and provided each other with communities of support at university. They have also taken up numerous African and Caribbean Society positions, launched access conferences and initiatives, and campaigned for change within their institutions.

Target Oxbridge alumni have gone on to spread the ethos of the programme beyond its formal limits. As a result, many more Black students now start sixth form knowing that Oxbridge is a possibility for them, and where to get the support they need to apply. A common theme in the applications to Target Oxbridge these days is one of students wanting to pursue an Oxbridge degree so that they can show their wider community what is possible. We look forward to continuing to support students to achieve this with the help of the universities of Oxford and Cambridge, our sponsors, our mentors and our alumni.

Ten Years of Impact

Rare launched Target Oxbridge in 2012 with the aim of increasing the number of Black African and Caribbean students attending the universities of Oxford and Cambridge, and contributing to the Oxbridge intake becoming representative of UK society.

Over the past decade we have worked with over 2.000 students across our Target Oxbridge, Target Oxbridge Digital and Target Oxbridge Year 10 programmes.

Over 350 Target Oxbridge students have received Oxbridge offers over the past decade.

Our students have a high chance of receiving an invite to interview, with 71% of our students who have applied over the past decade being invited to interview at either Oxford or Cambridge.

Our students also have a success rate which is double that of the national


average, with 41% of Target Oxbridge students who have applied to Oxford and Cambridge over the last ten years receiving an Oxbridge offer.



Black African and Caribbean students make up close to 5% of the A Level population¹. When Target Oxbridge was launched, just 1% of students accepted to Oxbridge were Black African, Black Caribbean or Black Other, which meant Black students were significantly underrepresented at the UK's top universities.

It is the case that 4% of the UK-domiciled students accepted to Oxbridge for 2021 entry were Black African, Black Caribbean or Black Other. This means the number of Black students admitted to Oxbridge each year has quadrupled since 2012.

In 2021, 24% of the Black students accepted to Oxbridge were Target Oxbridge alumni. We are very happy to have made a significant contribution to the improvement of the representation of Black students at Oxbridge through Target Oxbridge.


Applications made to Oxbridge by Black African, Black Caribbean and Black Other students

The charts and graphs below provide a more detailed insight into the number of UK-based students of Black heritage applying and gaining entry to Oxford and Cambridge each year between 2013 and 2021.


The data is drawn from the admissions statistics published on the University of Oxford and University of Cambridge websites. The data is based on declared ethnicity, and so actual numbers might be higher. For the purposes of these graphs and tables, Target Oxbridge data relates to Black African, Black Caribbean and Black Other students only. Students of mixed race are not included in these graphs and tables as these students are reported on separately by the universities.

It should be noted that the 2020 Year of Entry was an outlier across the university sector. In response to the pandemic affected A Level grades, many universities took in more students than usual, resulting in acceptance numbers for all groups rising above expected levels. These numbers started to be brought back in line in 2021. The fall in the number of offers made to Black students between 2020 and 2021 is therefore a reflection of a fall in the number of university places offered by Oxford and Cambridge overall. It is not specific to Black students.

Target Oxbridge's Reach

Our Target Oxbridge programme for Year 12 students is focused on supporting students of Black heritage to apply to Oxbridge. We recruit a cohort reflective of our wider applicant pool, working closely with the universities to ensure contextual data is considered as part of our application process.

Programme Updates

Target Oxbridge started as a programme focused on supporting Year 12 and Year 13 students to apply to Oxford and Cambridge. This remains Target Oxbridge's main focus, but over the years, the programme has expanded to cover a wider age range, provide more support and make the most of different modes of delivery. A number of Target Oxbridge's new elements came about in response to the pandemic, as the shift to online delivery provided the opportunity to reach a larger number of students.

Target Oxbridge

The main Target Oxbridge programme now supports 160 students each year. The students apply at the start of Year 12 and are interviewed in the winter. The students selected for a place on the programme are onboarded in February and attend a launch event in late March. All students receive a one-to-one meeting with a dedicated contact at Rare, and have regular catch up calls every two to three weeks to discuss subject choice and university application preparation.

During the Easter holidays, 80 students attend a three-day residential visit to Oxford, and the other 80 attend a three-day residential visit to Cambridge. This is complemented by a series of subject specific webinars run by Rare to provide the students with the chance to hear from Target Oxbridge alumni studying their subject.

Over the summer months, Rare runs the Target Oxbridge Summer Development Programme, a series of academic taster sessions delivered by Oxford and Cambridge tutors in a range of subjects. The students also have the opportunity to visit Oxford or Cambridge for a day.

The team at Rare provides students with personalised personal statement writing support and a subject specific mentor from late August until December, as well as pastoral support throughout the rest of Year 13. Rare supports the students accepted to Oxbridge to prepare for their studies, and all Target Oxbridge students are invited to become Rare candidates to receive free careers support throughout university.

Target Oxbridge Digital

Target Oxbridge Digital was launched in response to two things – large amounts of demand for Target Oxbridge places, and the Covid-19 pandemic. In 2020, the number of applications to Target Oxbridge passed 1,000. With Rare operating a waiting list of over 200 students, and all activity moving online due to the pandemic, it became clear that there was an opportunity to support more students at a time when support was desperately needed.

We therefore launched Target Oxbridge Digital in response to this need. This programme provides up to 200 additional students with access to events and activities, including an online Target Oxbridge Digital launch event, the Target Oxbridge Easter webinar series, and the Target Oxbridge Summer Development programme.

The students on Target Oxbridge Digital also have the opportunity to attend online events focused on subject choice, college choice and personal statement writing, providing them with an opportunity to ask the Target Oxbridge team questions and receive advice on their specific concerns.



The first two years of this programme were delivered to fill the gap for students who had lost the opportunity to take part in university access activities due to the pandemic. For future years, we will be monitoring and evaluating the impact of Target Oxbridge Digital more closely and refining the programme's offering.

Target Oxbridge Year 10

In January 2021, Rare launched Target Oxbridge Year 10 alongside Trinity College Cambridge. The programme was designed and developed by Naomi Kellman and Jon Datta, and has supported close to 500 students in both 2021 and 2022. This programme has the aim of providing Black students with access to role models who have studied at Oxbridge at a younger age. It also aims to provide students in Year 10 with high quality advice on how to choose GCSE and A Level subjects in a way that maximises their university course options, whilst also encouraging them to aim high during their GCSEs.

The programme consists of four webinars which introduce the students to life at Oxbridge. The students hear from current Black Oxbridge students about what life at Oxbridge is really like and how they made their course choices throughout their studies. Students are also provided with advice on what Oxford and Cambridge are looking for in applicants, as well as the opportunity to hear from a graduate recruiter about the range of courses that top employers value.

Following the success of the 2021 programme, a further two Year 11 webinars were introduced to provide students with advice on how to begin developing their subject interest for university through supra-curricular activities, and how to develop good revision habits.

The evaluation of the first year of the programme demonstrated that it led to a significant improvement of the students' understanding of how to choose their A Levels, what life at Oxbridge was life and what Oxbridge was looking for in applicants. An article on the programme was featured in the Journal for Widening Participation and Lifelong Learning⁶.

This year's programme has been run alongside Trinity College and St Catharine's College Cambridge, and in 2023 Target Oxbridge Year 10 will be run by Rare with both Oxford and Cambridge.

Target Oxbridge Podcast

The Target Oxbridge Podcast was also launched in response to the pandemic, in an attempt to provide a wider audience with free content at a time when everyone was at home. Naomi Kellman, the Founder of Target Oxbridge, hosts the podcast. She speaks to a different guest each episode, all of whom are Black Oxbridge students, alumni or staff. The episodes are available on Apple Podcasts and Spotify.

The podcasts has provided insights into the lives and careers of accomplished Oxbridge alumni such as Matthew Ryder QC, as well as the experiences of Target Oxbridge alumni applying to a range of courses, including Medicine, Law, Engineering and HSPS.

To date, the podcast has been played over 12,500 times. It has also been referenced by a number of current Target Oxbridge students from outside of London as the way they learnt about the programme, demonstrating the value of free online content that can be accessed by students all over the country.

Alumni

Target Oxbridge has hundreds of alumni who have now graduated from a number of top universities and embarked on a wide range of careers.

The programme was designed with an understanding that progression from university into a secure and fulfilling career was a primary concern for Target Oxbridge students and their parents. It was also informed by Rare's years of experience working to diversify the country's top graduate schemes.

Target Oxbridge students have therefore had the opportunity throughout the years to visit the offices of the employers that sponsor the programme, and to hear from their recruitment teams about what it is they look for when recruiting for internships and graduate schemes. The students have also received clear messaging about the importance of starting career planning at the beginning of university, and the value of engaging with careers activities as early as sixth form, where appropriate and possible.

Over the years, a significant proportion of Target Oxbridge alumni have become Rare candidates and received free careers support and advice to apply to employers within the industries of banking and finance, the Civil Service, consulting and law.

We are very pleased to see so many Target Oxbridge alumni flourishing within a wide range of careers. We have profiled a selection of them here to share their stories and celebrate their successes.

Imani Shola is a Senior User Experience (UX) Researcher at the John Lewis Partnership, working within Waitrose's Digital team. Day to day she helps to design the website, app and mobile experience for Waitrose. She enjoys looking at food all day!

Imani is also the founder of the ISLA Gift, an initiative which secured partnership with Churchill College Cambridge and which provides students of Black heritage with university support via funding and mentorship. Since 2020 the ISLA Gift has supported about 50 students.

Imani says that the ISLA Gift was in many ways inspired by the selfless help her Target Oxbridge mentors gave her — she wanted to give back and help others in a similar way. Imani was a Target Oxbridge student ahead of securing her place at Cambridge to study Modern and Medieval Languages from 2015 to 19. From the personal statement reviews, to the visits to Oxford, to the lifelong friends she made on the programme - Imani considers Target Oxbridge as key to helping her secure her university place.



"Target Oxbridge gave me the confidence to take the leap of faith to apply to Cambridge. Even after admission, the Target Oxbridge and wider Rare team continued to encourage and support me to 'own my experience' and I'm forever grateful for that."

Despite initially struggling with imposter syndrome as the only Black girl in her cohort of over 300 students, Tse graduated with a first class in Manufacturing Engineering from St Catharine's College Cambridge, having been described as 'a powerhouse of innovation and creativity'.

Tse became President of Impact Through Innovation Cambridge (ITIC) developing engineering technologies to address issues of homelessness in Cambridge, plastic pollution in global coastal communities, and meeting the ventilator demand during the COVID-19 pandemic. She also founded a sustainability start-up, Cascade, building an app to help users cut carbon emissions by up to 30%.

Motivated by her initial experiences of Cambridge, Tse championed access and inclusion work at the University. She became the Diversity Officer for the Engineering Society and the BAME Officer for her College. She led two access initiatives in response to the COVID lockdown. With a team of 80+ volunteers they produced 20 offer-holder subject guides, and an online platform called aim, which demystifies Cambridge life for people from minority ethnic groups and was featured on the BBC.

In 2020 Tse was recognised as one of the Top 10 Undergraduate Students for Social Impact nationally, and in 2021 she was awarded the Vice Chancellor Award for Social Impact. Tse hopes to continue her career in sustainable development, focusing on energy.





As a former Target Oxbridge candidate, the act of educating and guiding young prospective academics and professionals is something Ebun holds to a high level of importance.



Michael Bakare will be joining McKinsey & Company in 2023 as a business analyst, having completed a successful internship at the firm in the summer of 2021.

Born and raised in Enfield, North London, Michael is the middle child of three. His parents were both raised in Nigeria and immigrated to the UK in the 1990s. Michael attended his local comprehensive state school where he was Deputy Head Boy. From there he secured a place to study Philosophy, Politics and Economics at St Hugh's College, Oxford and graduated in 2022. Access and social mobility have been key drivers in Michael's work, in his first year of university he worked as the Junior Access Officer at the African and Caribbean Society. In his second year, he was elected as President of his Junior Common Room. Presiding during the height of the covid-19 pandemic, Michael worked with college leadership to help design the new normal for students returning to an in-person university experience.

Michael has also taken on advisory board positions outside of university, currently, he is a member of the OECD's youth advisory board (Youthwise), where he seeks to represent the perspectives of young people at internal and ministerial-level meetings.

Tobi grew up in Newham, East London, to first generation Nigerian parents. Having heard about Oxford growing up, it did not seem like a tangible reality until much later.

From a young age, studying became a routine. Every year, Tobi's Mum would buy him revision guides from the school year above, pushing a study regime every evening. As a teenager, it became apparent that Tobi needed to find a passion for learning himself. He was able to find this in Science when he started his GCSEs.

Tobi applied to Target Oxbridge during his gap year. The team assisted Tobi in interview practice, enabling his admittance to Exeter College, Oxford to study Biochemistry. During his time at Oxford, he enjoyed the support network of his wider cohort, spending most of his social time with the African and Caribbean Society or the University Football XI, simultaneously captaining his college team for the 2019-2020 season.

During his final years at Oxford, Tobi joined Rare's Consult Programme, where the guidance provided set him up to work as a Health & Life Science Strategy Consultant for a top London firm. Before commencing, Tobi worked as a Candidate Co-ordinator on the Rare Consult Programme where he assisted other candidates in their consulting applications.

Prior to Bain, she studied an MEng in Chemical Engineering at UCL, and next year she will begin her MBA at Harvard Business School, having been selected for the Harvard 2+2 program. During her degree, Gavra completed several Investment Banking internships at firms such as JP Morgan, Morgan Stanley and BNP Paribas.

While she enjoyed her experiences working in Investment Banking, Gavra quickly began to realise that she wanted to start her career in a role where she would be able to develop her business acumen more practically, while also having the opportunity to travel and work on a wide variety of projects across different industries. Now, years later, Gavra has found such a role in Management Consulting.

In her short time as a consultant so far, Gavra has had the opportunity to work in several countries, with a broad set of clients, ranging from Private Equity to Consumer Products. He went on to study Economics and Management at Wadham College, Oxford and graduated in 2021. At Oxford, he was the Vice President of the Oxford Finance Society and played football for both university and college.

In his spare time, he enjoys videography and recording memories he creates with family and friends. He also loves perfecting his Japanese, collecting limited-edition trainers, playing football and watching Arsenal at the Emirates Stadium.

She was involved with a number of programmes that aimed to improve the diversity of the institution, taking on the role of Liaisons Officer for the Cambridge African and Caribbean Society, working within the University's Cambassadors outreach programme across the UK as well as the role of Girton College Women's Netball Captain.

After graduating, Hannah joined Goldman Sachs, an investment bank, where she currently works as a rates trader and is involved in a scheme that channels capital to entrepreneurs from diverse backgrounds.

In her spare time, Hannah works with students to help them improve their financial literacy and provides mentorship to those looking to enter the financial services industry. She also works with people to encourage them to use movement to work towards wellness.

Ope Oreyemi was born in East London and is of Nigerian descent. He studied Law at Keble College, Oxford, and was a Senior Access and Outreach Officer of the African and Caribbean Society. He was also on the committee of the Law Society. One of his fondest memories from university was volunteering in rural China for 3 weeks, where he taught English to young students.

After receiving offers from Allen & Overy, White & Case, and Clifford Chance, he is currently undergoing his training contract at Clifford Chance. As part of this, he has spent six months in the firm's Abu Dhabi office, and is also set to undertake a six-month client secondment at Airbus, in France. He's also been involved in probono work, notably collaborating with the Paralegal Pathways Initiative, which involves speaking to formerly incarcerated individuals in the US about a career in law.

He is a recipient of the Harvard Book Prize, the Future Leaders Award, and participated in a roundtable discussion at 10 Downing Street to discuss social justice initiatives with the Prime Minister's special advisor.

Elizabeth Oladunni is a fourth seat trainee at Slaughter and May due to qualify into one of the firm's corporate groups in September 2022. She first applied to Target Oxbridge when she was 17, and with the support of the Target Oxbridge team and many others who invested in her academic progress, she secured a place at Pembroke College, Oxford.





Phoenix has completed his first three years of pre-clinical studies, attaining a Bachelor of Arts in Medical Sciences. He is now in the penultimate year of what has been a very long degree. At Oxford, Phoenix has not only been able to further explore his academic interests, but also interact with a variety of people from different backgrounds and have a variety of experiences which have changed his life for the better.

Most importantly to him, Phoenix has been able to get involved in a number of access initiatives at both a student society and university level, with the hope of inspiring students and supporting them to make better informed decisions about their future, in the way that Target Oxbridge helped him.






